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Diamond Jubilee 2012 Update James Agnew

On Thursday 2nd Feb an open meeting about the Diamond Jubilee weekend was held at the Social Club. Members of the steering group, chaired by James Agnew, presented a draft programme of suggested events and activities. The meeting was attended by representatives of parish clubs, societies and organisations. James, and the steering group, highlighted that the current programme is only a draft, based on the many fabulous ideas that have been forthcoming from clubs, societies, businesses and individuals. The Jubilee weekend is from Saturday 2nd - Tuesday 5th June.

The programme, so far, includes a village breakfast, music festival and fun day, a community church service, community sing-along, a



regatta style event at Polwheveral and a fun triathlon. There will be a marquee set up beside the Social Club which, as well as being used as a venue for a range of activities, will host a big screen to show national events such as the Queen's pageant on the Thames. There is also support for the idea of a village lantern walk to Bosahan Quarry to mark the end of the celebrations on the Tuesday evening.

Representatives from the Playground Regeneration campaign attended the meeting and were enthusiastic about links which could be made with the Diamond Jubilee events to promote the playground cause (see story on page 5). Paul Carter, chairman of the Parish Council, also highlighted that the Parish Council will be presenting children with commemorative mugs to mark the Jubilee.

At the end of the meeting the steering group stressed that anyone wishing to get involved with organising events or activities or volunteering over the weekend, is encouraged to do so, and that the steering group will help facilitate ideas and support groups to work together. 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Jubilee Memorial Park Regeneration Tamsyn Gendall and Russ Johnston

Shortly before Christmas, Constantine Parish Council removed the wooden castle in the village play park due to safety concerns, leaving behind little more than a few venerable swings, two decaying benches, a sandpit and a heavily pruned camellia. The castle had weathered seventeen Cornish winters; it was dangerously degraded and beyond repair. There is no money to replace it.

In January, a group of concerned parents approached the Parish Council to ask for support with a regeneration scheme and the Council enthusiastically agreed to help. A well-attended public meeting followed, chaired by the Parish Council, which resulted in the formation of a steering group (Jubilee Memorial Park—JuMP). The volunteer effort will draw on the expertise of Tatia Churchill, Community Regeneration Officer for the County Council. We've already had some press coverage, with an article in the 9th February edition of the *West Briton*.

External funding opportunities are scarce and competition for them high. To succeed we will need to demonstrate broad community support and match fundraising with local donations. The need to rebuild the park falls thirty-five years after the land it occupies was initially purchased—to celebrate the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977! By rolling park fundraising in with the Diamond Jubilee celebrations, we can make this a year to remember and give ourselves a memorial park to be proud of. Over the last month we have been collecting ideas and suggestions from the village and will continue to do so. We have sent out a questionnaire to all families with children at the pre-school and primary school, and encourage you to send suggestions and advice directly to us by email (constantinejump@gmail.com).

Local father and professional landscape gardener Matt James has offered to work with his students to transform suggestions into blueprints for park designs. In early summer we will call a meeting to present the alternative designs and report on initial fundraising. Watch this space—we'll need your help and support to make this happen!

Bus Routes: Alec Robertson, Message to Members, 30 January 2012: 'One of the most important issues discussed at last week's cabinet meeting was the future of the supported bus routes in Cornwall. Every second Saturday of the month (and sorry, we did close for Jan and Feb!) from 9.30am to 12 o'clock in the Church Hall, you will find a wonderful range of fresh local food on sale - and very often for tasting too.

We have everything for your breakfast: bacon, eggs, sausages, mushrooms and tomatoes, the bread for your toast (and the jam to go on it), and tea and cof-



fee. There are perennial plants and wonderful flowers, the meatiest pasties and pies, veggie pizzas and some of the best ciabatta ever. You'll find full-flavoured beef from the heathland of the Lizard, and, from even nearer to home, Sylvia's pork (great crackling). There are locally smoked fish fillets and patés, chutneys and cheese, and a wonderful array of fresh seasonal veg and fruits. Finally, you'll find a superb range of cakes and beautiful puddings. Despite all this temptation, one lady I overheard in the little café area enjoying a pot of Shane's fresh coffee and a slice of homemade apple cake said, "I don't really come here for the food, it's just so lovely to catch-up with people from the village I wouldn't normally see otherwise, share a pot of coffee with my friends, and I get to admire any new babies!"

Transition Constantine started the Farmers Market in March 2011 as a project of the Food Sub-group. We decided from the start that we should meet in the pub for our monthly meetings (well, we are the 'foodie group' and that must include beer and wine!). Liz Bayntun, Ann Mullaly, Fran Ford and Mandy Milano planned the market and found the stall-holders (we now have a waiting list!). Other helpers regularly turn up early to help with setting up tables, unloading goods for the stall-holders and clearing-up afterwards (Jenny Parshall deserves special mention). There are other unsung heroes who step in to help clear-up or do a bit of washing up for Shane. Thanks to all of you. But let's face it, we do it because it's fun (okay, apart from the times that we wonder if anyone will turn up, or buy anything, oh, and the really wet days... but we are getting the hang of it now!). Saint Constantine's Feast Day Liz Moore

Very little, if anything, is known for certain about Saint Constantine, except that he was one of the few Celtic saints to be a Cornishman. One legend claims that Saint Constantine was a nephew of King Arthur, to whom he bequeathed his crown when he was mortally wounded. There was a Constantine, King of Dumnonia (a kingdom which comprised Devon and Cornwall) mentioned by some early historians as living around the middle of the sixth century or earlier. He was known locally as Constenton or Constentan until recent times. Most sources state that our saint was, at first, wild and violent and may even have committed murder, but after his conversion he put away his sword and became a monk and missionary. The Feast of St. Constantine is observed on March 9th or the Sunday nearest.

Saint Constantine's Feast celebrations in the past have taken many forms. One source notes that a mock mayor was once elected following the parish feast: 'The mayor was adorned with a hat, and having taken his place in a cart was dragged through the village by other revellers who, like himself, had generally been well plied with liquor.' Another source notes that, 'The procession usually started from the Queen's Arms, and halts were made at various places... If there had been any scandal in the village during the year a halt would be made at the house of the chief actor or actors, and advice given as to their future conduct. After a tour of the village, the cart was sometimes drawn down to the river at Ponjeravah, and the worthy mayor toppled in.'

In 1869 the Feast Celebrations had a dark side, and that was the destruction of the Tolmen Stone, a massive egg-shaped granite boulder weighing 750 tons, that sat above the quarry at Maen. This stone was a tourist attraction in its own right with people traveling from Falmouth and Penryn to see it. This stone, the size of two double-decker buses side by side, was blown from its rest into the quarry beneath. Why the stone was destroyed we don't know, but one thing is certain—within a month an act was passed in Parliament to protect such wonderful natural ancient monuments from wanton destruction. You could say English Heritage started here in Constantine!

The Feast Concert in recent years has been held on the Tuesday nearest the feast day, and this year is no exception. The Concert will be in the Tolmen on Tuesday 6th March at 7.00pm. Already there is much practicing going on by those involved. Entry is only £2, so come and join us. There is also to be a Patronal Service on Sunday 11th March at 10.30 am and this will be followed by a Parish Lunch in the Church Hall to which all are invited.

Transition Constantine News in Brief Chris Hussey

Jubilee Trees

To celebrate the anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's historic Diamond Jubilee, the Woodland Trust is helping communities across the UK to plant 6 million trees. They hope that communities, schools and families will plant individual trees, groups or whole woods to celebrate the event. Transition Constantine has received a pack of 420 trees from the Woodland Trust and will be working with village groups to plant trees in and around the village.

Community Farm near Truro

Truro's Transition Group is working with a local farmer, Victor Barry, to establish a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) scheme on the outskirts of the city. The aims are all about increasing local food production, involving the community and helping them to learn more about growing food.

Ladock - the 'Sustainable Village'

Last year the parish of Ladock won the Cornwall Rural Community Council's 'Sustainable Village of the Year' award. Ben Giles, a Cornish based documentary maker, has made a short film about how the community embraced low-carbon living, and the lessons they learnt along the way. 

In this first contribution we set out a few hints to finding one's way around the night sky. The star chart is set for 10pm April 1st. Hold the chart so that the direction you are facing is at the bottom. The lower half shows the sky ahead of you. The centre of the chart is the point directly overhead.



Find the Plough or Ursa Major(UMa) and using the two right hand stars extend a line northwards, ie up the chart to the pole star Polaris. From the pole star pick out Ursa Minor(Umi). Using the two left hand stars of the Plough extend a line downwards until you come to a bright star Regulus. Regulus forms the base of an asterism, the Sickle in Leo. An asterism is a line of sight effect, the stars being at great and varying distances from us. Comet Garradd is a binocular object for most of March and April. Take the middle of the line between Polaris and the end right hand star of the Plough, from this point extend a line at 90 degrees towards the horizon. In early March Garradd will be close to or nearly level with, Ursa Minor and should appear as a fuzzy ball. April brings the Lyrid meteor shower, the name indicating the radiant, the part of the sky from which they appear to originate, Lyr on the chart and has a bright star Vega. The prediction is for 10 to 20 per hour and they should be visible from the evening of 21st to dawn on the 22nd. Jupiter is well worth viewing in early March before it slips away westwards. With binoculars try to spot the Jovian moons, Io,Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. To download your own free chart and notes go to www.skymaps.com/store.

Past Times

Excerpt from 'Gunn's Cornwall', date unknown. Cutting supplied by Gerald Trethowan.

"Just off the main road from Penryn to the Lizard at Bosahan is the Trewardreva Fogou, more commonly known as Pixies Hall. This is a slightly curved passage some 66 feet long and up to 6ft 6ins in height with rough granite walls and the remains of a fortified enclosure, traces of which can still be seen. It was thought to be once used as a smugglers cave but is traditionally regarded as a home of Cornish Fairies.

Folklore has it that Cornwall is the home of no less than five varieties of fairies: the Spriggans (ghosts of giants), the Small People (Spirits of Cornish ancestors who, since they grow smaller each year are virtually invisible), the Knockers (who lived in mines and were thought to be the souls of early Jews who had mined for tin), the Brownies (household fairies who were good or mischievous by turns) and the Piskies. It is this last group, much given to evil deeds such as luring travellers into bogs, robbing houses and carrying off children in the dead of night who were most often said to inhabit the hall."
