A suggestion was made to record all the village choirs for the Jubilee, to raise funds for our proposed very active weekend of celebration. The recordings took place during April, in many different locations. I have always been amazed at the talent in this village and this recording proves it. Our CD is available from Constantine Spar, The Stores and choir members, a great present for friends and family who live away from the village. All proceeds go to the Jubilee expenses fund, and excess money to the Parish Council Jubilee Project Fund. We sent a copy of the CD to The Queen and received a thank you letter from Buckingham Palace, below.

We initially planned to take a photograph for the cover design, but everything was looking dull and uninspiring from Calamansack in the rain of April. Then I saw Lin's amazing painting hanging in the Tolmen Centre. Desmond Reynolds 1982 introduction to the "Who's Where" was used as the CD introduction:

try some five miles to the north. Farms and quarries, fisheries and builders, shops and garages provide jobs and services. Housing developments have increased the size of the village and brought new blood and ideas to supplement the many 'local' families ensuring the survival of this ancient settlement. If the buildings are of hard granite, the hearts of the people are of gold in this friendly and thriving community."

We are still that friendly and thriving community, though none of the quarries are working. With over forty clubs, groups and societies, we organised a huge weekend of events for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June, and we sure did enjoy it.

Parish Matters Robert Williams

This report straddles the months of May and June and thus covers the momentous events of the Diamond Jubilee. What happened will be recorded elsewhere but the Parish can be justly proud of the planning and execution by residents, who were lauded at the June Meeting. James Agnew, Chairman of the Steering Committee, had attended the May Meeting to discuss the planning, which the Council had sponsored to ensure that there were sufficient funds available to prime the pump. The investment seems to have been amply rewarded by the events themselves and the surplus on budget, a result always to be welcomed.

In May, the Council Chairman, Paul Carter, had given his review of the past year. There had been some difficult times, such as the cessation of the Youth Club due to poor attendance and problems at the Social Club, but completion of the car park extension and improvements at the Social Club, meant that on balance, we had emerged on the credit side. He thanked the many efforts to assist the parish by County Councillor Hatton, including the financing of the car park. All this was recognised nationally by invitations to the Royal Garden Parties to himself and other villagers, together with the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service to the Constantine Enterprises Company, a.k.a. the Tolmen Centre.

The May and June Meetings dealt with nine Planning Applications, none of which were challenged, much to the relief of the Councillors, who dislike frustrating the wishes of their constituents, although it has to be done sometimes. The Police must have been active elsewhere for no report was available in June. In May, they attended the fire in the village, and in their annual review noted 56 crimes, compared with 51 in the previous year. There were 18 criminal damages, 14 assaults,11 thefts, and 6 burglaries, with a detection rate of 30%. Their work also dealt with liaison with the school, boat thefts in the Helford, parking problems and rogue traders. Like poverty, malefactors are always with us.

The unstable banking in Brillwater Road will be costly for the Parish as the County deny responsibility. We will have to find some thousands to rectify the matter, an unwelcome outcome when we need the money to replace the playground equipment. Happily, the JuMP committee are very active and hope to raise £5,000 this year. At the June Meeting a new Model Code of Conduct aroused some dissent from Councillors who objected to some of its provisions, which seemed to hamper rather than encourage informed debate. It was agreed to revisit the topic in July but force majeure will have its way and the law obeyed, even if it is sometimes an ass.

We are delighted to announce that Jubilee Weekend proved a spectacular success for JuMP. Our Saturday sponsored Hike and Bike from Constantine Bay back to the village was



very well supported, with crowds gathering outside the Social Club to welcome the triumphant participants home. Despite blisters, aches and a 4am start for the walkers, they remained cheerful the whole way and never once ran out of conversation. Meanwhile, the cyclists took on the relentless Cornish landscape fuelled by a combination of jelly babies and masculine bravado. Some of them got lost, one crashed into a road sign and another went AWOL only to be discovered in a coffee shop after a half hour search, but all of them made it back eventually. On the Sunday, a range of activities in the Pavilion accompanied the decoration of the willow carriage. We ran a barbecue, sold cakes and other goodies, hooked ducks, raced snails, and set up a stock to punish miscreants. It's astonishing how eager children are to turn their parents' pockets inside out for the privilege of throwing wet sponges at an adult. We'll certainly be using that one again. Throughout, there was a wonderful atmosphere with kids more or less keeping themselves entertained and the Social Club doing a roaring trade to grateful parents on an otherwise gloomy afternoon.

Jubilee Weekend was a milestone in the JuMP campaign. Our total amount raised shot from under a thousand pounds to close to three thousand. Thank you to everyone who contributed. The generosity and goodwill extended to our cause has been heart-warming and inspirational. However, we still need to keep going. We require at least five thousand pounds by the end of summer to be in a good position to begin applying for external grants, which typically demand matching at around the 5-10% mark.

Sadly, our plans to open up the tower of St. Constantine's have had to be cancelled: the Church has no insurance and the Lord moves in such mysterious ways that safe conduct up and down the steep steps cannot be guaranteed, even for so worthy a cause as JuMP. If anybody has any other ideas for a fundraiser, please get in touch. There are sections of the community we have not yet found a way to draw in and we need to know what you would like us to do for you. Forthcoming events will be advertised in the usual spots around the village.

Royal Oak Planted

One of the trees donated to Constantine by the Woodland Trust was a 'Royal Oak', grown from an acorn from one of the royal estates. The tree was planted by Freyja Allen, aged six, who has helped to plant many of the Woodland Trust trees around the village. Village Freecycle Initiative

At the Jubilee weekend 'meet the group' occasion, Transition Constantine launched a trial 'Freecycle' board where unwanted items could be offered free of charge. A fridge/freezer and a dishwasher were offered and both had been snapped up by the end of the morning. They were later installed in the social club and will therefore be used by the community, which is very rewarding. Given this success Transition Constantine will be putting a Freecycle sheet in the notice board at the top of Well Lane, opposite Spar. 
Farmers Market News Mandy Milano

The market continues to thrive and is proving a popular place to meet once a month for coffee. My apologies to those who have been asking about the finances of the Market - it hadn't occurred to me that anyone would be interested! To explain in brief: to end of April 13 markets have been held with an average of 10 stalls @ £5 per stall = income of £650. Monthly expenditure: hall rent £25, electric meter £3, tea/coffee for stallholders £5, diesel for driver who puts out signs £6. Total £39 x 13 markets = £507. One-off expenditure includes table cloths £30, receipt books £7, materials for road signs £10, mulled wine at Xmas £15 AND 2 new folding tables £140. Total £202. So income of £650 and total expenditure of £709 - which means I am hopeless at keeping the books and currently owed £59.

The Farmers Market was never meant to make money - just give local producers an opportunity to do business, and a chance for local people to buy great local produce. We would really appreciate a couple more volunteers to help out if one of us is away and a plea from me for a Treasurer! So to anyone interested in the finances please step forward email mandymilano@hotmail.com.

Past Times (regular historical feature provided by Gerald Trethowan)

Falmouth Packet, September 6, 1986

Earthquake. 3.45p.m. Tuesday Sep 2. The moment a village trembled with fright.

Fear and near-panic gripped the villagers this week as an earthquake shook homes, gardens and streets at Constantine for the second time in just five years. Elderly people are too frightened to go to bed, people rushed to their front doors and into the streets and pets scuttled into corners and hid under beds. Reaction from villagers at Constantine varied from fear and shock to passive indifference as once again the village and surrounding countryside was shaken by earth tremors. People had been going about their everyday business on Tuesday when at 3.45pm the ground began to move beneath them and their homes and gardens started to tremble.

Fourteen-year-old Annabel Battersby was walking along the garden path at the back of her mother's home in Wheal Vyvyan Estate, when she heard a loud bang followed by a rumble and then the smashing of glass. "Our back door has three panels of glass in it," she said. "One of these smashed as the tremor came and later we found that a smaller pane of glass has also smashed in one of the front windows in the house. It was very frightening."

Mrs. Ella Farrington, of Bowling Green Road, said that all her dishes had started rattling. "I heard a loud bang and thought two aeroplanes at Culdrose had crashed. Somebody else in the house thought a lorry had crashed into the house," she said. A shopkeeper in Constantine said she had been hanging out her washing on Tuesday afternoon, after closing up the shop, when the ground started moving like quicksand.

And Mrs. Beth Hocking of Fore Street, who is a newspaper correspondent for The Packet, said that villagers told her they had been "terrified" by the tremor. "Some were frightened to go to bed last night," she said the morning after the quake. "And some of those didn't get changed for bed, because we were warned there might be more tremors during the night."

One eye witness said that just after the tremor the calm basin in the Helford River, where hundreds of yachts and small craft are moored, suddenly became "choppy" with large waves pounding the shore. Then, as suddenly as it came, the sea was calm again.

Watching a family stand on a pavement seeing their home burning down in front of them was one of the most humbling and difficult experiences of my life. We could muster clothes, and nourishment but that night, solutions and answers abandoned us altogether.

Only upon reflection has it struck me that even in our rather relaxed, conserved and quiet surroundings, we seem to have an expectation and a perception that answers and solutions in this world should be instantly accessible. Ten years ago, problems that today, can be solved in an hour would have brought a person to their knees with quandary.

It is at times like that horrible night that we are rudely reminded that our lives, our expectations and our privileges are frankly ludicrously out of kilter with what is real and indeed what is possible, and now and again something that we have no control over mercilessly brings us back down to earth.

I don't believe in fate anymore. Somebody told me recently that fate is a term that we throw over one or more coincidences that come about due to deliberate actions or inactions on their or someone else's part. We canter through our time on this earth thinking that the things we see on the news won't happen to us, but they do. What the News cannot and does not show us is what happens afterwards when the victims, our friends, are adjusting to an entirely new way of life. A new habitat, new clothes and a whole new list of things to do; forget the holiday this year people, we have to rebuild our livelihood.




* Night Sky July/August Robert Beeman

Note: To receive a copy of the star chart for July/August please email constant.times@gmail.com, or collect from the envelope on the door of The Constant Times office at the Tolmen Centre.

At this time of year the Milky Way constellations dominate the view, but unlike the winter constellations we are looking into the centre of our galaxy. If you have a good southern horizon look for the "teapot" shape of Sagittarius with its very dense star fields.

Move upwards and eastwards to find the tiny constellation of Delphinus the Dolphin. Above and to the west is Albireo, the southernmost star of Cygnus, one of the most spectacular double stars in the night sky; even a small telescope will reveal the contrasting blue and gold of the two components.

August 12th/13th sees the peak of the Perseid meteor shower. The radiant will be high in the NE in Perseus, which is just below and to the east of the W shaped constellation Cassiopeia. The best time to see these meteors is after midnight but you stand a good chance of



seeing the odd one or two as soon as it's dark. While you are waiting try and find the Andromeda galaxy M31, the most distant object visible to the naked eye, which lies below the westernmost star of Cassiopeia.
