

History Book of Constantine - over 50 copies already pre ordered!

Sally and I would like to thank everyone for their support and encouragement for our project to write another history book for Constantine. Neither of us have ever embarked on such a challenge and the realisation of how much work is involved is now becoming a reality. Sally has been hard at work interviewing folk and recording many stories, collecting photographs, making masses of phone calls and helping raise funds by having a stall on her drive selling an interesting variety of goods. Many hours have already been spent in Cornwall Records Office researching for information, talking to printing companies and a graphic designer.

We have decided that the first chapter in the book will focus on Constantine in 1949. A year when the Methodist Chapel (now the Tolmen Centre) closed for renovation and redecoration in January, and the BBC broadcast from the Queens Arms in December. There was Carnival week, Sports days, dances, thunderstorms and the sad death of a much loved Vicar after he collapsed in the Church, all these events sparking a memory in many of local residents, giving us material for the book.



We cannot put everything we research or are given into the book, but we shall use all the information and photographs to create an exhibition which will run alongside the book launch which will be available to view at Constantine Museum. Copies of photographs will be donated and stored in the archive at the Museum together with any oral history accounts. It is a dream of an idea that at the end of the project we may be able to install somewhere in the village, a listening post for our oral history accounts, however this will very much depend on funding and planning permission.

The project is self funded, not relying on any grants and any profits will go towards the upkeep and maintenance of Constantine Museum. We are aiming at a print run of just 250 books in the first instance and presently we have 50 pre ordered. We are hoping to keep the cost of the hardback book between £20 and £25. Copies can be pre ordered through Sally Coot.

# Constantine Cricket Club starts a new innings

As many of you will have noticed or heard there's been quite a lot going on at Boulder Parc over the last year or so. With two teams competing in the Cornwall Leagues

on Saturdays, friendlies on Sundays and a flourishing youth section we have needed to upgrade the ground and facilities to attract players and bring on youngsters from within the village and surrounding area.

On Tuesday nights during the season we have had, on aver-

age, 40-50 boys and girls learning the basic skills, running around and enjoying the freedom they need while learning about the disciplines of the game and, perhaps, life in general. We've also just started Women's softball sessions on Monday evenings which we hope will develop into a proper team structure in due course.

To improve the infrastructure (which was originally set up in 1995 following a massive effort by our Trustees) we have, over the last year, built a new roller shed, refurbished the score box, overhauled and upgraded the machinery, landscaped the pavilion surrounds and generally spruced everything up.

Our latest project has been to build a stylish bar following a successful application for a license to sell alcohol. The bar will be open on match days, practice evenings and occasional events and will provide us with a vital income stream so that we can realise our ambition to build a dedicated practice net in the far corner of the field which will cost in the region of £20,000. The pavilion itself is available for local groups and modest gatherings at reasonable rates.

As we approach the centenary of the Club (although we are not absolutely certain of the year!), we are determined to drive cricket in the village forward despite the

challenges of running participatory sport in this era of passive entertainment. We depend on volunteers, local support and players of all standards so please feel free to drop in, say hello, buy a beer and if you've got a skill or a trade we can probably take advan-

tage of you! Practice nights in the season are Wednesdays - all welcome.

# Bosahan Simmentals win Stithians virtual Show Beef Championship John & Bridget Olds

Due to the lack of agricultural events being held during the pandemic, Stithians Agricultural Association staged a virtual show in July where entries could be photographed and

e-mailed to the various section secretaries and judged on-line.

Bosahan were delighted to win several prizes in the cattle section including championship and reserve in the beef breeds division. Stock forward were judged by Jonny Dymond the senior auctioneer and auction centre manager at Shrewsbury Auction Centre. He joined Halls in 2017 and started his career with Kivells in his native Cornwall and Devon.



The champion Kinclaven Infusion is a polled British Simmental bull born 15 August 2017 and was bred in Perth Scotland. He was purchased at Stirling Bull Sales in February 2019 and selected as reserve male champion at Royal Cornwall Show the following June.

Winning the beef bull any age class of 13 entries the judge described him as exactly what he looks for in the senior stock bull, stylish head, wealthy even shoulder, extra length, solid flesh in the loin and deep full rounds.



Selected in reserve was Bosahan Harmony Whitney born 19 February 2016. A third calver she is currently rearing twin heifer calves by Infusion. Shown successfully at Royal Cornwall in 2017 winning the yearling heifer class and standing reserve female champion.

Winning the beef cow class of 11 entries the judge described her as a fabulous maternal cow, she strikes me as a real character with the natural instincts of the Simmen-

tal breed which are outstanding milk producers compared to their continental counterparts. Being very milky with desirable teats she should rear her calves well.

In the group/herd class of 12 entries three young calves caught the judge's eye. All born in 2021. Left to right meet Mars, Matilda and Mercury.

Many of you will have seen these cattle grazing in fields close to the road on your circular walks from the village through Brill and back.

# Future of the Church Hall - survey results

#### Transition Constantine

The Church Hall was listed as a community asset by Cornwall Council in 2020. Transition Constantine circulated a questionnaire with the last issue of Constant times to gauge the opinion of the community about the future of the Church Hall.

We did not include a link to the Church' Diocese's plans for the Hall as we were told they were confidential. They are now available on the planning portal -PA2100737/TR11 5AN. or just type in Constantine Church Hall and the plans will come up. The application is for preplanning advice, after

which the Diocese will decide whether to go for full planning permission or not.

Once the property goes on the market, the community has six months to raise the money to bid for it. The Diocese does not have to accept the community bid, but it cannot sell it until the six months is up.

97 Households returned the survey, which is apparently not a bad response, although we are conscious that not everyone has had their voice heard about the future of the Church Hall. 75 people would be sorry to lose the Hall (previously the village school), while 67 said they thought the Hall should be kept as a community building.

Two things stood out from the survey - a desire for physical activities in the village (45), and clubs and other provision for children and young people (48). The main focus of Transition, in the face of the Climate Crisis, is to help to build a resilient community, so it is desirable to provide facilities locally where possible rather than people having to drive to access keep-fit or sea-scout meetings etc.

Transition Constantine also has two lists of wishes for the village from the two Constantine Community Days that we hosted.

It is obvious that the Church Hall, if retained. cannot meet all the needs expressed and indeed should not be in competition with other

> facilities within the village.

It is also essential that the Hall would need to be financially sustainable, so it will be necessary to create permanent income streams from was a desire expressed for office/

the building. There

studio or workshop space in the questionnaire, so if anyone would be interested in renting a space within the Hall, please make contact.

In order to review the needs of the community, Transition Constantine is hosting a workshop with all the existing amenity providers on September 1st at the Tolmen Centre. The intention will be to review which venues can meet the various expressed needs and to explore future possibilities that result in a more resilient community.

If there is a desire to acquire the Hall for the community, it will be necessary to start fund raising in the near future. We will be seeking someone to take on the role of project leader to raise funds, working with funding experts that we are in contact with, to create the money for a six month part time salary for them, and money to carry out a feasibility study and business plan for the Church Hall. Further fund raising can take place in parallel.

# **Bosahan Woods Wildlife Survey**

Earlier in the year the woods management group became aware that Bosahan Woods are classified by Cornwall Council as a 'County Wildlife Site'. This is a county-specific designation that does not have the statutory significance of, say, a Site of Special Scientific Interest. It has meant, though, that we were entitled to a free survey of wildlife in the wood carried out by Cornwall Wildlife Trust. Accordingly, the woods were surveyed in late spring by Sue Hocking of CWT.

The resulting report has some interesting observations and a number of specific recommendations. Perhaps some of the more significant are that we should aim to:



- over time, reduce the beech dominance of the wood, to improve the wildlife value of the wood, and to also increase resilience to climate change;
- · remove non-native species with invasive tendencies;
- re-coppice some of the hazel in the formerly coppiced area, with the aim of reintroducing a coppicing rotation;
- make some native shrub plantings to supplement the 'sparse understory';
- consider applying for a Countryside Stewardship Woodland Management Plan grant to support production of a 10 year woodland management plan

Adopting these recommendations would in some respects, and in the longer term, change the 'feel' of the wood. so it will be important for the management group to explain fully the rationale for any actions proposed, and to seek the views of the local community on the extent and the timing of any actions as recommended in the report. # Glebe Woodland Works under way

After a long wait, on 1 June Transition Constantine (under the auspices of the Constantine Enterprises Company) took on the tenancy of the 2-acre parcel of Glebe woodland in the valley between the cemetery and the allotments.

We're now beginning to make the area safer for walkers and other users, and to make plans for caring for the woodland into the future. Frequent Glebe walkers will have noticed that Iron Orchid Landscapes have started tree works to remove precarious trees overhanging the paths. So far, they have felled a stem of a mature ash that had split from its base and was suspended on another tree over the main footpath, and taken down a mature wild cherry that had split and was threatening to collapse onto the old rhododendron and the adjacent clearing. Another day of work is planned in August to address similar hazards at the lower end of the path.

### Why the Church Hall lease was relinquished

It cannot have escaped your notice that there has been a lot of talk about the future of the church hall. I have heard and seen a great deal including a survey form asking for people's opinions. So I thought that it would be appropriate for me to state the reasons why the church has relinquished its lease on the hall and in so doing, counter any rumours and mis-information which may have been circulating.

The church hall, along with the car park, the teas under the trees area and the associated parking area and what are known as the Glebe fields, belong to the diocese and are administered by the Glebe committee. The church hall car park, the public toilets and the teas under the trees area and associated parking area are rented by the Parish Council. The Glebe fields are rented by Mr. Paul Carter of Trengilly Farm.

The reasons the Parochial Church Council gave up the lease on the church hall are as follows: Constantine church has embarked on what is called the Matthew 20:28 project which aims to re order the church to better utilise the space and make it much more open for community use. The hall was expensive to maintain, is in a poor state of repair, and has, for some time been very underutilised. We realised that almost all the activities that took place in the hall could be accommodated in other locations rendering the church hall redundant with regard to its past uses.

One of our main concerns in giving up the lease on the hall was that the community should not lose any of the facilities associated with it. We entered into negotiation with the Glebe committee and it was agreed that they would provide a new car park in the Glebe field which would have a capacity three times greater than the existing one; and if there is one thing this village needs it is more parking, that the "Teas Under the Trees" area should remain, and the new car park would not encroach on or spoil this valued resource in any way. A new toilet block would be built to the left of the current church hall car park entrance, some 30 yards away from the existing one which would not only be a modern building but also include full disabled facilities. All of these improvements would be supplied at no cost to the community.

The two main users of the church hall were the Arts Society and the Guides and Brownies. The Arts Society now meet, and will shortly be holding their first exhibition, in the church.

The guides and the brownies now meet at the cricket club. This is an excellent location for them having clean, modern facilities and a huge, safe outside space for other activities.

The church has set up a community cafe, Monty's, which provides quality hot and cold drinks and a welcoming, comfortable place to relax and meet with friends along with a children's play area

all in beautiful surroundings. There is a free hyper fast Wi-Fi connection, along with hot desks especially set up for people who wish to access this service. These facilities have proved to be incredibly popular with young and old alike.

As the Matthew 20:28 project progresses the facilities that the church can offer will also increase.

Working together with the other village organisations, The Tolmen Centre, The Social Club, The WI, The Cricket Club and the School and identifying what each

has to offer will mean that there will be almost no activity that cannot be accommodated.



# A note on homelessness and an opportunity to help

Constantine Book Group Plus welcomes Patrick Gale - live streamed to the Tolmen Centre on Thursday 9 September

This fund raising event for Emmaus Cornwall will start at 6.15pm. Patrick is a prolific writer and brilliant speaker who lives in the far West of Cornwall. Patrick will be in conversation on Zoom about his work, including his latest novel, *Mother's Boy* (due out on March 1 2022), with his friend the novelist Cathy Rentzenbrink. This online talk will be raising badly needed funds for the superb charity Emmaus, which works to prevent homelessness.

Along with a Project Manager, a group of dedicated volunteers are working to set up Cornwall's first Emmaus community, providing people with a chance to work their way out of homelessness. The Emmaus vision is for a world in which everyone has a home and a sense of belonging.

Becoming homeless has a devastating impact on someone's self-esteem. This is not something that is always resolved just because they get a roof over their head. Emmaus offers something different. Those coming to live at an Emmaus community are provided with a home for as long as they need it, companionship from others and a sense of purpose, as everyone works together to support their community.



Cornwall is suffering acutely from the impact of the economic downturn, with more and more people living in poverty, struggling to make ends meet, and many finding themselves homeless. Since 2012, the number of people reported sleeping rough in Cornwall has doubled and the devastating economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic means that a significantly greater number of local people are now without a permanent home. An Emmaus community in Cornwall will offer a home and meaningful work for those who have experienced homelessness.

There will be second-hand books on sale and lots of opportunity to talk books! The bar will be open. The evening will start with an introduction from Richard Williams at the Tolmen Centre. He will give a brief insight into the aims of Emmaus Cornwall followed by the live streaming of Patrick in conversation with Cathy Rentzenbrink.


# Night Sky

Arcturus, an orange star at the foot of Bootes dips below the western horizon at dusk as it follows the Great bear Ursa Major around the polar point. It is a sign that the season is changing as we lose sight of the brightest star in the northern half of the sky.

Looking high above, Cephus the King and Lacerta the Lizard touch the Milky way to the north and south of the zenith respectively. Lacerta's zig zag of stars may be a small asterism but it contains several telescopic star clusters and is well worth a look with binoculars. The celestial Lizard is one of several minor constellations created by the 17C Astronomer Hevelius of Danzig.

This is the time of year for big shapes in the southern night sky. Over to the west the Summer Triangle (or perhaps now the Autumn Triangle), defined by Vega, Deneb, and Altair is populated with countless stars and is worth exploring with binoculars. The Square of Pegasus, with Pisces below it is almost due south. Orion is starting to rise in the east with the shield following Aldebaran and the Hyades cluster in Taurus. This is the reminder that the winter skies approaching. The belt stars of Orion Mintaka, Alnilam and Alnitak point downwards to the south east towards the Dog Star Sirius which will rise at about midnight towards the end of October in Canis Major, the Great Dog.

There are some meteor showers to look out for in October. The Orionids are a

major shower active for about a week either side of the 21<sup>st</sup> of October. These are associated with Comet1P/Halley as are also the n Aquariid shower in May. The second pass in October is generally more favourable for northern observers but this year the full Moon is on the 20<sup>th</sup> of October so considerable interference from moonlight will be experienced.

A better chance of seeing some meteors is with the Southern Taurids in early October. The peak is the 10<sup>th</sup> of October when a waxing crescent Moon will be far more cooperative than for the Orionids.

Around the 20<sup>th</sup> of October the Northern Taurids begin to show some activity, these peak in early November; both Taurid showers produce slow, but bright meteors and share the same parent comet, Comet 2P/Enke.

During this period both Saturn and Jupiter will be in the south to south south west at around midnight. Both are in retrograde motion,that is appearing to move backwards in their orbits because of the relative positions of the planets and Earth and how they move with respect to one another. They will revert to direct motion on October 10<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> respectively. Venus will be low in the south west just after dusk. Mars will be too close to the Sun in September to be seen and is at superior conjunction in early October when it passes behind the Sun from our view point.

Wishing you clear skies.




