Diamond Jubilee Stone Unveiled Caitlin DeSilvey and Peter Tatham

In March, after months of planning, an 8 ton piece of granite appeared in the middle of the village, next to the bus stop. Since then, the feature has undergone a transformation, and in brilliant sunshine on Saturday 23 November a large group of villagers participated in a ceremony to unveil Constantine's Diamond Jubilee Stone.

James Agnew, the chair of the Diamond Jubilee Organizing Group, opened the ceremony with thanks for all of the people who helped make the Diamond Jubilee project possible. Before unveiling the stone, Tracey Clowes (former Curator of the Constantine Heritage Centre), traced the fascinating history of Constantine granite, from its incorporation in the ancient fogou at Trewardreva, through its use in the construction of many important local and national buildings and structures, and up to the closure of Bosahan Quarry in 1993. The new Diamond Jubilee Stone incorporates a Parish Map, which will be the starting point for the planned Granite Trail, and also incorporates the certificate of Her Majesty the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, which was presented to the Constantine Community in 2011. *continued p.* 2

Constantine Parish Council Report Liz D'Alton

Summary of Parish Council Meetings October 17th and November 14th, 2013

During the Public Question time (6.45 - 7.00 pm before every Parish Council meeting) members were told that there are some dangerous potholes at the Penbothidno Estate entrance and on some road edges. Also, the printing facility which produces *The Constant Times* is in dire need of a cash injection if it is to continue.

There had been only two crimes reported, as well as nine other offences, mainly concerning parking and anti-social behaviour. PCSO Gardiner is now training to be a police officer and PCSO Huddlestone is away, sick.

Councillor Hatton reported that the historic fingerposts will be repainted. The arm missing from the Calamansack post is being recast but there are arms missing from the post at High Cross; Councillor Hatton is trying to trace them. If you have any information about them, please contact any councillor.

Also, he was given a telephone number for emergencies - anything from a fallen tree to more serious calamities: 01872 326546. This number is manned at all hours.

Finally, the public had been invited to suggest ways of cutting costs and improving Cornwall Council services, but he thought it unlikely that there would be no rise in Council Tax.

The number of vacancies on the Parish Council has risen to three with the resignation of Cllr. Lewis. The posts will be advertised in this and the Church magazine.

Dog Exclusion Ban. Since it is a regulation that such an order be advertised, it will be advertised in *The Constant Times*.

Invitations to tender for cutting the grass in the closed churchyard will be placed on notice boards and in this magazine.

Christmas Trees. As there was little interest shown last year, it has been decided not to purchase trees for residents of Fore Street this year.

A notice requesting people not to park on the bend will be placed on the southeastern end of the New Cemetery wall as parking there creates problems for drivers and would be a hazard for emergency vehicles. Page 4 Volume 2, Issue 6


Update on the Tool Library Chris Hussey and Simon Allen

In the last issue of the *Constant Times* Transition Constantine announced plans to consider the viability of a tool library where villagers could share those incredibly useful items of equipment that are only ever periodically needed. It is hoped



that such a village resource might save unnecessary commercial hire or duplicate purchase of kit as well as encouraging people to get to know each other a bit better. Thank you to all those who contributed to the survey at the October Farmers Market and for all the kind offers of donations or loans to help set up the scheme. As a result we have begun to piece together those items that seem most popular.

Early indications have shown strong demand for a carpet washer, trailer, ladder and pressure washer (see graph below). This is a good start, although we are aware that we are still only really engaging a small cross section of the community at large. In order to get a better idea of what might prove most useful to the majority of people we have set up a survey page on the Transition Constantine website. If you have access to the internet and would be interested in voting on the tools that would prove useful to you please look at the 'Tool Library Survey' post on http://constantinecornwall.com/transition/ and use the 'comments' link to give your vote and/or make further suggestions. If you are not online but would like to provide some feedback or get involved in setting up this resource please contact Robin Curtis (340375) or Chris Hussey (340007). Cricket in Constantine Nigel Logan

Cricket in Constantine has a long history and today, in Boulder Parc we can boast that we have one of the best village grounds in the county with a spacious, bright and modern pavilion with its very own Long Room. Boulder Parc is currently home to two clubs - Constantine CC who play in the Cornwall league on Saturdays and Trengilly CC who play Sunday cricket against a mixture of occasional, village and touring sides. Next year we hope to



enter a team into the midweek Mining League where the shortened 20/20 form of the Game is played. The season runs from April through September.

Constantine CC was founded in 1926 and moved to Boulder Parc in 1997. Prior to that cricket was played on the Recreation (football) Ground. This was never a satisfactory arrangement as the seasons overlapped and made preparation of the wickets very difficult. I remember watching a team of cricketers on hands and knees with teaspoons and buckets of topsoil working their way across the "square" filling football stud indentations. The creation of Boulder Parc was a remarkable project led by Mark Rowe, who remains today the driving force behind the Club and is very much Head Groundsman. Club President, George Dengler first played cricket for the village in 1938.

Trengilly CC was formed in 1991 and for nearly twenty years had their own ground at Trevassack. In 2012 the very difficult decision was made to leave Trevassack, pool our resources and move to the purpose built Boulder Parc facility. The move has worked very well with both clubs sharing resources and players and we are all convinced that the Game in the village is stronger as a result.

We are all determined to build on the strengths we have and will strive to grow the Game in the village. We will outreach to the community to encourage everybody, young and old, to get involved. We are very excited that Constantine School is now one of very few Primary Schools that is teaching cricket and will do everything we can to help this along. Please come along to Boulder Parc next season and watch and even better get involved at whatever level or capacity you can. Turn up at tea and you might even get a free cuppa!

The Clean Neighbourhoods & Environment Act 2005 Notice of Intention to Make a Dog Control Order

Notice is hereby given that Constantine Parish Council proposes to make a Dog Control Order under Part 6 of the Clean Neighbourhoods & Environment Act 2005. This Order will make it an offence for any person in charge of a dog to take the dog onto, or permit the dog to enter or remain on, The Recreation Ground, Constantine at any time.

<u>Exceptions and Defences</u> In respect of this Order, it would not be an offence if the person in charge of the dog has a reasonable excuse to breach the Order or the Trustee has given its consent to their doing so. This Order would not apply in respect of a number of circumstances where the dog is used for assistance purposes as defined by the Order.

<u>Penalty</u> A person who breaches the Order would be guilty of a criminal offence and liable on conviction in the Magistrates Court to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale (currently £1,000).

<u>Land in respect of which the Orders will apply</u> The Order will apply to The Recreation Ground, Constantine. Full details of the land to which the Order relates are set out in the proposed Order and its accompanying plan.

Inspecting the Orders The proposed Order and accompanying plan may be inspected free of charge at Chy Lean, St Keverne Road, Mawgan, Helston TR12 6AY between 10.00am and 4.00pm Monday to Friday (excluding bank holidays). Further copies can be requested by post, by calling 01326 221648 during normal working hours or by sending an email request to colinchapman@lineone.net

<u>Representations</u> Representations in respect of this Order may be made within 28 days of the date of the publication of this Notice. The Council will be considering any representations received when deciding whether to make the Order. Please note that all representations received together with the name and address of the person making them could become available for public inspection. If any person wishes their name and address details to remain confidential then they should make this clear in their representations. Constantine History Group October Report Don Garman

Following a guided walk around Helston in July 2012, Marion Smith visited Constantine to talk about the Plantagenet Earls of Cornwall. Following the Norman Conquest, the title of Earl of Cornwall was often conferred on a member of the royal family or a noble who had found favour with the monarch. In 1337 the Duchy was formed and subsequently the male heir to the throne received the title. The Plantagenet Earls and Dukes held sway over Cornwall from 1154 until 1485. The family name, adopted in the 15th century, was taken from the emblem of the common broom (Planta Genista) said to be worn by the 12th century Geoffrey of Anjou, the father of the first Plantagenet King Henry II.

Marion focussed on five of the Medieval Earls and the first Duke. John of Gloucester and Cornwall, later King John, is important to Helston as by bestowing the town's charter in 1201, he released residents from paying taxes to Baron Odo and provided opportunities for the burgesses to collect taxes and for merchants to benefit from several tax exemptions when travelling and trading elsewhere. The charter was signed by King John under the Wych Elm at Tollard Royal whilst hunting on Cranbourne Chase, Wiltshire. The town paid 40 marks (13s 4d or the price of an oxen) for the charter and was also required to make an annual payment in two instalments plus "a dainty palfrey at Christmas". Marion hypothesised that the burgesses may have travelled by boat and land to collect the charter.

John's younger son, Richard, was given the title. Very entrepreneurial and good at self-promotion, he used part of his fortune to purchase castles in Cornwall. He renewed the charter for Helston and increased the benefits, including revenue from the water mills along the Cober. Richard was followed by his son Edmund, a quiet, studious and religious man whose favourite residence was Restormel and who developed the Duchy Palace in Lostwithiel and built Helston Castle.

Edward II gave the Earldom to his favourite, Piers Gaveston, who was exceedingly unpopular at court and received his comeuppance from the Earl of Warwick. The successor, John of Eltham, the youngest brother of Edward III, died at 20 but not before he had increased the annual payment from Helston. The increased sum and the impact of the Black Death meant that the town was struggling to meet the payment; however, on becoming the first Duke of Cornwall, the Black Prince, son of Edward III, set aside the increase in 1354.

Don Garman, the Group's Secretary, thanked Marion for providing an insight into the economy and politics of the Medieval period and the impact of the Earls of Cornwall on the county and Helston.







* * Night Sky December/January Robert Beeman

The winter constellations are now back on the scene, the most obvious one being Orion. This makes a good stepping off point for a tour around the southern night sky. Below the belt stars is M42, the Orion nebula, a rich star-forming region of gas and dust. Binoculars or a small telescope should reveal the three trapezium stars which illuminate the gas and dust clouds.

Moving east along the ecliptic to Jupiter, try and spot the four main moons, which should be visible with binoculars. Depending on time of observation you may not see them all as one may be behind the planet. A little further east find Castor and Pollux in Gemini, and if the nights of 13/14th of December are clear look out for the Geminid meteor shower, which appears to originate from this area of the night sky. These can be quite bright as they are of asteroid origin rather than being cometary dust.

Comet ISON is due to reappear from behind the Sun at the beginning of December but will really be better for evening night time viewing from about Christmas onwards, when it will be climbing up in the northern night sky to be close to Polaris by the first week of January. By this time it is



predicted (it may not emerge intact from its orbit round the Sun) to be just reaching the limit of naked eye observation. ISON is a long period comet, probably originating in the Oort cloud, a suggested collection of icy bodies about a light year out from the Sun, so this is a once in a lifetime opportunity to see it.
