The Trengilly Singers, under musical director Melanie Uren, were presented with the 'Bolitho Shield' having won their class for mixed voice choirs of 30 or under, achieving marks of 87 (distinction), an excellent performance technically and artistically.

The choir then went onto compete for the prestigious Choral Champion-

ship Edgar Kessell Gold Award against Heyl St. Piran Singers, Mousehole Male Voice Choir and Perranarworthal Community Choir. The adjudicator Michael Johnson praised the choirs for their discipline, focus and commitment and awarded the Championship to the Trengilly Singers. The choir was accompanied by Colin Ellison.

Constantine Bell Ringers


Hearing church bells ring before Sunday service (and on practice night!) is an essential part of village life, which would be all the poorer without them. But, as in many towns and villages up and down the country, the continuity of this almost exclusively British tradition depends on the dedication, loyalty and reasonable fitness of a tiny handful of ringers.

Here at St Constantine, we'd therefore dearly like more people, young or not so young, to join our 'band' and learn to become fellow bell ringers. After all, what other unique 400 year-old team activity keeps you fit, exercises your mind and can introduce you to new friends? And we have a good laugh!


Ringing is well within the capabilities of most people: young or old; male or female. After just a few initial half-hour one-to-one sessions with experienced teachers to learn the basics, and then attending several subsequent practice nights, learners can usually begin ringing with the rest of the band.

You don't have to be particularly strong, know anything about music, or even be or become a churchgoer. Instruction is carried out safely under close supervision

and begins with a trip up the tower to see how the bells work, followed by some explanation and demonstration of technique, before having a go yourself on the end of

March meeting

Lawson Tickell, Business & Visits Manager at RNAS Culdrose, related the station's history to members of Constantine History Group.

Culdrose, named after one of the farms previously located on the site, was established in 1947 following a survey and selection in 1942 as the Royal Navy's second air station in Cornwall. The base is also known as HMS Seahawk, but at the time of

its opening, HMS Chough was also considered. However, this bird species was becoming very rare.

Lawson set the development in context of the history of flight in the Royal Navy, which dates back to 1909. The first Naval airfield on the Lizard area was the airship base at Mullion during World War 1. Initially, planes involved in anti-submarine warfare were based at Culdrose, but by



the late 1950s they were being replaced by helicopters, which could carry loads, move people, undertake air sea rescue as well as conduct anti-submarine warfare.

Culdrose today provides training for air-crew, observers, engineers, fighter pilots and deck crew. Current focus is training for the introduction of new aircraft carriers.

April Meeting

Peter Searle, a member of the Falmouth History Archive, introduced members of the Constantine History Group to a Falmouth dynasty of photographers who over four generations recorded scenes in the town and surrounding area. The history archive is fortunate to have a collection of 1500 images, which provides a valuable research facility.

In 1860, William Osborne came to Falmouth from St Austell to help build Falmouth Station. He settled with his wife in the town and established himself as a carpenter. One of his ten children, Earnest, developed an interest in photography and gained an apprenticeship. On completion, the opportunities of the USA attracted him and he gained experience in a number of partnerships before he and his Irish wife settled in Falmouth and set up shop in Arwenack Street.

The business grew and eventually employed 32 staff. In 1983 Brian Osborne died and his brother Maurice retired and unfortunately younger members of the family were not prepared to continue the business. The recording of the local area by the Osborne family over a century or so thus came to an end. The record left behind includes images of the "Paris" aground off Lowland Point in May 1899 and Robin Knox-Johnstons' return from his circumnavigation.

Peter provided a history of the family before sharing some of his favourite Osborne images.

Ordinary Meeting of Constantine Parish Council, Thursday 20 April

During Public Question Time, Mrs Purdy again raised the question of creating extra parking on the Penbothidno estate by using the wide (unkempt) grass verge. Because the verge in question belongs to Cornwall Council (not the Parish), she was advised to keep in touch with CCIIr Bastin.

CCIIr Bastin reported that as a result of a peer review, the future composition of the Strategic Planning Committee will better reflect the geography of Cornwall, with the number of members also being lowered to 15. A further recommendation, which allows Ward Members to put a case to a Planning Committee but not to vote, has also been adopted.

Seworgan Defibrillator:

In Parish Matters, members noted that Friends of Constantine Surgery have contributed £1,000 towards the cost of a defibrillator for Seworgan, to be installed in the Council-owned old telephone box. The community itself has raised funds for the electricity connection.

Recreation Ground:

Countryside Contracting has been hired to make repairs to the chain-link fencing, which is expected to be complete by early June. It was also agreed to make the repair and future use of the pavilion building an item on the agenda for the next meeting.

Welcoming Stones:

Suitable stones have now been selected from Boshan Quarry and the wording 'Constantine Welcomes You' was agreed.


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Night Sky Robert Beeman

The Sun is now approaching its highest position in the sky giving long days and short nights with the Milky Way dominating the night sky. At this time of year we are looking into the centre of our galaxy. If you can find a very dark site with a clear southern horizon, see if you can see the distinct fork in the Milky Way quite low down on the horizon.

Almost due south at about 60 to 70 degrees altitude the three bright stars, Vega, Deneb and Altair form the summer triangle. The westernmost star Vega is a blue white dwarf main sequence star. Only 25 light years away, it is the basis for colour and brightness comparisons with all other stars. Just to the east and slightly above Vega is the "double double" star. To the naked eye this is a double star system. With an amateur telescope, each is a double star system in its own right, and with more complex instruments a fifth star can be determined. The entire system is really quite close at 161 llight years.

If you have a telescope of at least 80mm aperture, seek out the Ring Nebula M57 which lies between the two lower stars of Lyra, Sheliak and Sulafat. This is a planetary nebula 1100 light years away and was formed when a Sun sized star reached the end of its life as a red giant and expelled its ionised contents into the interstellar medium. At the centre of the nebula there is a white dwarf which illuminates the dust and gas forming the ring.

For most of this period Saturn will be low on the southern horizon, compare the colour with Antares nearby to the west. Venus will be an early morning object low in the eastern sky. Given the few planets that are easily available, have a look at the Moon. Ideally chose a night soon after new Moon or a week after full Moon and concentrate on the terminator, the line between the dark and illuminated surfaces. This often gives good views of the relief and texture of the Moon's surface which are difficult to see when the Moon is full.

The August highlight is the Perseid meteor shower which peaks 11/12th and 12/13th of the month, but the Moon will be close to the radiant, the direction from which they appear to come. Try and find a spot shaded from moonlight and look towards the south or southwest and you should at least see the brightest meteors on a clear night. Last year we counted nearly 50 from midnight to 1am so see if you can beat that but be prepared for a long night as a)the hourly rate is not constant, and b)neither is the overall shower intensity as this varies from year to year.

Wishing you clear skies.

"Shopping Through The Ages", by Lesley Robinson, began with the gentlemen of wealthy households travelling to London at least once a year with a shopping list from their wives covering bedding, furniture, clothing etc. In the 1680s The Duke of Hamilton travelled from Glasgow

to London for his wife and 13 children. Women did not travel alone for shopping on the "dangerous & hazardous" roads. Risk of robbery and accidents were an every day occurrence. Horse-driven coaches took 3 days to travel just from Bath to London. There were 20,000 sophisticated independent shops in London during that time, the wool markets were the best in Europe, and Spittalfields was renowned for the best silk fabric.

The most lavish spending was seen at Court with King James 1 having debts of £200,000. Ante-suppers were a tremendous waste of food with tables laden to be "viewed" by guests on arrival! This was followed by entertainment, during which the tables were cleared, the food thrown away and another banquet supper with exactly the same food was laid out for the guests to eat!!

The coming of the railways into the heart of London made the cost of travel cheaper and bought department stores into the city. Small shops like haber-dashers and market streets were redeveloped in the 1830s when the first department store was opened in Regent Street. Most Stores would take credit

payments so were rather expensive, with the exception of Harrods who would only take cash and their goods were cheaper! Harrods had the first "moving staircase" (escalator) to encourage shoppers to go to the upper sales floors. Before 1911 Bond Street shops only sold exclusive men's wear and no buses were allowed in the area, only carriages.

Love it or loathe shopping, we can now shop without leaving home and in America you can now load a picture of your face onto a model and then "try" clothing on "the model" to see if it suits you! Such is the progress of shopping for the last 400 years. Lesley was thanked by member Carol Pearce who admits to enjoying shopping but not on computer. A very enjoyable look at the history of shopping.

March Meeting

Gary Long, the Head Gardener at Trewithen gave an illustrated talk on 'China, its plants and places'. Gary is only the third Head Gardener in the last 100years. He has visited China on a number of occasions, recently attending the International Camellia Society's Congress in Chuxiong, Yunnan Province. He has traced the footsteps of famous 18th century plant hunters and has received the award of International Camellia Garden of Excellence on behalf of Trewithen Gardens.

In his talk, Gary explained about the vast areas of China and the time it took to visit various places of interest to plant specialists. He mentioned that bamboo,

which has a multitude of uses, can grow 120ft in a year and can be seen growing 'before your very eyes'. Vast areas of camellias were ripped out due to the introduction of rape for its oil. However, the government has now realised that the camellias are a great tourist attraction and has started replanting. Fortunately, due to prevailing conditions, methods of reproduction are very successful. The techniques used do not work in Cornwall.

To emphasise the huge scale of life in China, Gary gave an example that at the 2012 Camellia Congress, there were more than 1million visitors! His talk was lively and interesting and not just for plant lovers!

April Meeting

Carol Richards from the Camborne and Redruth Fuchsia Society gave a practical talk on 'Fun with Fuchsias'. Carol has been secretary of the Fuchsia Society for the last 20 years.

She pointed out that fuchsias are very adaptable plants and may be grown as show specimens through various forms to hedging. Fuchsias originated in the

Southern Hemisphere and evidence has been found of their growth on all landmasses from the Arctic to Australia/NewZealand. Species, native to New Zealand, are notable for their blue pollen.

Carol demonstrated how to take cuttings using a 'pickle jar propagator', how to prune in order to grow 'standards', how to develop a circular shape of 'show plants', and the best way of developing Bonsai Fuchsias.

The meeting closed after a sale of ready rooted cuttings and small fuchsia plants ready for growing on.

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
Mullion Harbour Day

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
